When confident, children can find their own way to record the exchange/regrouping. Just writing the numbers as shown here shows that the child understands the method and knows when to exchange/regroup. 	 Children can start their formal written method by partitioning the number into clear place value columns.  Moving forward the children use a more compact method. Year 5/6	Compact method	Children can continue to be supported by place value counters at the stage of multiplication.  It is important at this stage that they always multiply the ones first and note down their answer followed by the tens which they note below. 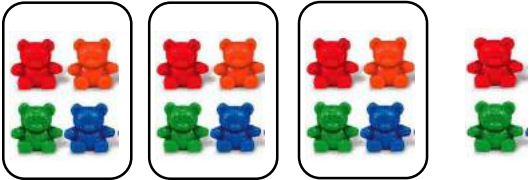
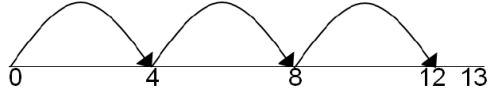
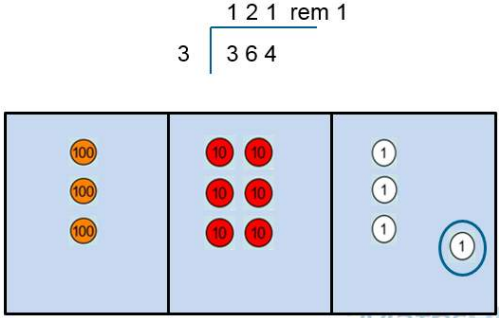

Year 1/2	Sharing	I have 8 cubes, can you share them equally between two people?	Children use pictures or shapes to share quantities.  $8 \div 2 = 4$	Share 8 buns between two people. $8 \div 2 = 4$ 
	Grouping	Divide quantities into equal groups. Use cubes, counters, objects or place value counters to aid understanding.  	Use a number line to show jumps in groups. The number of jumps equals the number of groups.  Think of the bar as a whole.
